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Dan Smoke reads a teaching about how the Big Drum came to the Anishinaabe people, originally told by Shelly Bressette. After, Dan Smoke, Mary Lou Smoke, and guest Harold Kohler tell listeners about events coming up in the London, Ontario community.

DAN SMOKE: That was **7th Fire**. The song, "**Colonial Attitudes**." We're going to talk a little bit about the **pow wow** season right now that's happening throughout Indian country this summer. The last weekend there was a pow wow up on the **Wiikwemkoong Reserve** in **Manitoulin Island**. This weekend, there's one taking place at the **Saugeen Indian Reserve** and next week, there will be a pow wow at the **Cape Croker Indian Reserve** that is a traditional pow wow. And also, next weekend will be the pow wow at the local **Chippewas of the Thames Reserve**. For our listeners who are in **London**, Chippewas of the Thames Reserve is about 20 miles outside of London near the town of **Delaware**. But I'd just like to take this one moment to read about the **teachings of the drum**. It comes from the July issue of **Native Beat**, and it's an article by **Shelly Bressette:**

"Today, the significance of the pow wow varies from one community to the next. Most communities view it as a seasonal celebration, a time to welcome old friends and reunite families. A time for sharing, giveaways, forty-niners. At the centre of every pow wow is the drum. Its beat, according to ancient mythology, represents the heartbeat of the Native Nations throughout North America. The drum is universal, and all Aboriginal nations from the Arctic Circle to the Gulf of Mexico had a drum society. Some used hand drums and others, water drums. The Big Drum, according to legend, was given to the Anishinaabe by the Great Spirit during a time when the Indian people were being wiped out by the [to be transcribed], the Big Knives, or American soldiers. Myron Pyawasit is drum carrier for the Smoke Town Drum Group from Green Bay, Wisconsin. He is Menominee and follower of the Big Drum. 'The Big Drum,' he says, 'represents health, love, peace, life, and death.' Pyawasit explained that the drum is sacred to his people. 'The Big Drum Society has many teachings,' he said, 'most are for Anishinaabe only.' He shared the legend of how the Big Drum came to the people. 'The Sioux were under attack by the Chemongins. A woman feared for her people, who were being pursued by the soldiers. She ran to a lake where she cut reeds along the shore and lay under the water. She lay under the water for four days, thinking in fear. Then the Great Spirit spoke to her. He told her he was giving her the Big Drum. He taught her the songs and the rules and told her that if the people followed the rules, no harm would come to them. He told her to gather four singers and four sticks, one for each direction. The woman taught them the songs given to her. She told them to offer sema, tobacco, to the Grandfather, the four directions, and the Great Spirit. She told them to form a circle when they sing their songs. 'Do not be afraid,' she said, 'Stay by the drum. Keep singing, keep praying. No harm will come to you." That is the legend of how the big drum came to the Anishinaabe. That is something I think that from time to time we will share with our listeners, some of our teachings.
